I am, however, often interrupted in these last exercises, after being told that I should consider other methods of improving my health, as I might be walking on thin ice, which, I would opine, is another form of


Oh yeah ... I also go over the edge and beat around the bush. Now if that's not enough exercise to keep me slim and trim, I don't know what is.
